Be as specific as possible.</i>	A search of crime data and calls for service revealed that beat 1223 had the highest rate of shootings amongst all the beats in the district for both the years of 2019 and 2020. In 2019, beat 1223 had 13 shooting incidents, or 17% of the total shootings in the 12 th District. In 2020, (year-to-date) beat 1223 has had 16 shooting incidents, which is 14% of the shootings in the 12 th District. Complaints of these shootings were also heard in 1223's beat meetings, community interactions, and also at the annual community conversations (for the district strategic planning).

Non-enforcement strategies must be included.</i></p>	<p><i>Non-enforcement response (required):</i> The 012th District is going to work with the Office of Operations to request custom notifications for known gang members in the affected area with ties to the narcotics sales. Additionally, the district's Community Policing Office will locate vacant lots that are used by drug dealers; the office will also collaborate with the city services to get areas cleaned up and fenced in as necessary. Public lighting in the area will also be addressed. Work with CHA Security in the area will also be conducted.</p>		
	<p><i>Enforcement response (if applicable):</i> 012th District tactical teams will conduct shooting missions during the required times. The identified watches will determine times when shootings spike on their watch and ensure beat 1223 is on the beat during those peak times. A request will be made also to the narcotics unit to address the narcotic sales. Beat 1265 (Overtime Initiative for public housing) will conduct missions also. In addition, police vehicles with plate-reading capabilities (ALPR) will be utilized whenever possible (since vehicles used in shootings are often stolen).</p>

Job fairs and employment training will also be presented to offer employment opportunities.

More specifically, beat 1214 had 22% (184 incidents) of the theft from auto incidents in the 12 th District in 2020. Beat 1214 has had the highest number of these incidents for the past 6 years (2014-2019). Complaints of the thefts from autos were also heard in beat meetings of beat 1214 as well as community interactions.
