Assign all Watches to conduct Focus Deterrent Missions and have the SDSC Room conduct Pod Missions in problematic areas to prevent further shootings.	Maintain dialogue and exchange information with community (Prayer Vigils, Outdoor Roll Calls and Beat Meetings), recruit new block clubs (Neighborhood Pop Ups), and educate residents (School Gang Prevention Seminars and Crime Reporting/Witness Resource Fairs) to assist with the reduction of shootings and homicides.
