Priority #1: Abandoned Buildings		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Community Residents have safety concerns regarding abandoned buildings, abandoned open garages and vacant lots. Crimes like batteries, robberies and burglaries as well as illegal narcotic activity in these areas have community members concerned about being targets	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Abandoned buildings are used to gang members to package and sell narcotics. Abandoned buildings/garages give cover for criminal activity i.e., robberies, batteries.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Crimes associated with Abandoned Buildings are a district-wide concern. However, most crimes associated with abandoned building are occurring on Beat 522, 511, 512, 513

Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Community Resident of Beat 511, 523 and 531 have the highest arrest of juvenile offenders during school hours. Beat 524 has the highest number of curfews	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Community Residents are experiencing a high number of criminal trespass to vehicle, PSMV and Robberies occurring during school hours and after curfew hours. Approximately 20% of crimes committed by juvenile occur during these restricted hours.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Beat 511, Beat 523, Beat 531, and Beat 524

Also, target area associated with Minors arrested for criminal activity.
