#### SECTION 1 – PROBLEM SOLVING ON CRIME REDUCTION PRIORITIES

Priority #1: Reduction in Shooting Incidents		
<b>Problem Statement</b>	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> The victim(s) are adults and youth throughout the district. Due to the current gang conflicts in the district, the quality of life of the community as a whole has reduced because of fear of being targeted.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> The offenders seem to target members of opposing gang factions within the district. Due to drug territorial areas, the gangs are committing drive-by shootings and directly targeting individual gang member(s).

	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders are using call-up service and open air drug markets to distribute narcotics to drug users. The offenders meet at gas stations and convenient stores to carry out their transactions.
