SECTION 1 – PROBLEM SOLVING ON CRIME REDUCTION PRIORITIES

Section 1 focuses on chronic, long-term problems, to be addressed over the course of a year and identified by the community.

Priority #1: Robberies		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Generally, victims are students and younger adults listening to music from their cellphones and not paying attention to their surroundings. No specific race or gender is targeted in these robberies	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders are average height and weight, usually clothed in dark colors to conceal their identity. These Offenders use force to take items, typically cellphones and purses, by force (pushing down, yanking from hands) from victims not paying attention to their surroundings. Robberies have been noted at all hours, but typically peak during afternoon and evening hours	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Sidewalks, Alleys and CTA Property. Areas conducive to allowing these incidents to take place: poorly lit walkways, alleys and streets, crowded sidewalks and terminals

Description <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	Beat 0914Adam has been established with strict beat integrity. In addition, Officers assigned to this beat will be equipped with wanted offender information, crime patterns and flyers to disperse in an effort to bring awareness to the community. These missions will include meeting with business owners, Chinatown media outlets and stake holders concerning emerging crime patterns and trends on a regular basis.

Alleys and residential streets are being used for avenues of escape to help conceal their identities as these roads are less traveled

Description <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	Utilize SDSC analysis to target areas where shootings are most likely to occur. Conduct directed missions and POD missions, as well as increased foot and bike patrols in those concentrated areas	Conduct positive loitering and outdoor roll call events that involve collaborating with churches, block clubs, and DAC members. These events serve as a means of showing not only force but acts as a deterrent to criminals looking to perpetrate crimes in this area

Offenders are using the element of surprise riding on a bicycle before drawing a weapon and shooting at citizens. Offenders, usually clothed in dark concealable colors, are using stolen vehicles to perform shootings in gang saturated areas primarily during late afternoon and evening hours.
