	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Subjects openly selling illegal narcotics, mainly heroin and cocaine, on the public way, often using bushes and bags to hide the narcotics.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> 501 N. Kedzie Avenue, 111 N. Kedzie Avenue, 2700 W. Washington Blvd., 2700 W. Warren Avenue.

<b>Problem Statement</b>	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Owners of automobiles parked on Beat 1215, 1215, & 1224	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders are damaging parked vehicles to enter and remove items from inside the vehicles. Often, however, offenders check car door handles to see if they are open, enter and steal without causing any damages.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Parking and valet areas on Beat 1214, 1215, & 1224

<b>Problem Statement</b>	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Residents and Businesses located in Beats 1212 & 1215	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i>	

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	<p>Offenders are stealing unattended packages after packages are delivered, sometimes jumping over fences, with the packages being in plain sight. Very often offenders will enter and sneak into buildings behind a resident who opens the entry door.</p> <p>3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i></p> <p>Residential and businesses building with porches and hallways.</p>

<b>Description</b> <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	Package theft missions will be conducted which target most common times and locations of the offenses based on analyzed reported data.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Foot, Beat, and Bike team officers will increase daily patrols of the affected areas and be equipped with the latest information of crime trends on their beats.</li> <li>Foot, Beat, Bike team and Business officers will be directed to interact with residents and businesses in the affected areas creating an increased presence. Said officers will offer best practice and awareness information.</li> </ul>
<b>Community Resources</b> <i>List involved community stakeholders and specific commitments</i>	United States Postal Service, Amazon, FedEx, UPS to adopt best practices for proper securing package deliveries to the affected communities and offer more secure options (i.e. drop box locations) for patrons.	Neighbors of the West Loop Association, Ukrainian Village Neighborhood Association, European American Associates Food Pantry, West Central Association & Chamber of Commerce, and Ukrainian Cultural Center to encourage members to engage in best practices for deterrence, prosecute offenders and host Community & Police engagement events (i.e. Coffee with a Cop, & Positive Loitering). Said Stakeholders to encourage usage of secure package drop box locations.
