SECTION 1 – PROBLEM SOLVING ON CRIME REDUCTION PRIORITIES

Section 1 focuses on chronic, long-term problems, to be addressed over the course of a year and identified by the community.

Priority #1: Burglaries		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Nearly 40% of the district's burglaries through October 2019 have occurred in the 30 sector, mainly to residences during 2nd and 3rd watch.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Forced entry is the most common method used for burglaries, typically through back doors and side windows. Typically, jewelry, electronics, and/or currency is stolen. Motive is presumed to be financial gain. Offenders tend to walk out residences after they commit burglaries and have a getaway car waiting for them nearby. Offenders have also been known to flee on foot as well as on bicycles and in vehicles.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> 30 Sector: Belmont to Irving Park Rd- Cicero to Des Plaines River.

Priority #2: Motor Vehicle Theft		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> The bulk of motor vehicle thefts have affected residents within the 20 sector, occurring mostly during overnight hours.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders typically target vehicles that are left running with the keys left in the ignition. In other cases access to vehicles often include breaking windows.

	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders typically target unlocked vehicles where valuables are visible and are stolen. Offenders also commit theft from auto by stealing catalytic converters, rims, and tires. Thefts tend to happen during overnight hours.
