SECTION 1 – PROBLEM SOLVING ON CRIME REDUCTION PRIORITIES

Priority #1: Robberies		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Citizens in the 19 th District / Patrons that use public transportation / visitors to the entertainment area.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Offenders are beating the victims up by hand and taking victims possessions by force or pulling guns on their victims and demanding their possessions. Offenders flee by using vehicles, public transportation, or on foot.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Belmont/Redline, Wilson/Redline, Clark/Diversey. Entertainment area Halsted/Roscoe	
Mitigation Missions	Mission #1	Mission #2
Description <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	The 19 th District will utilize the entertainment bike team that will patrol the entertainment area aggressively especially on weekends. The Robbery team will also conduct proactive patrol of these beats as well as set up missions at the CTA Stations to deter robberies.	Utilize the SDSC room to gather information of areas with higher incidents of robberies and conduct proactive patrol and missions in these areas. Utilize the SDSC room to conduct POD missions and monitor CTA stations.
Community Resources <i>List involved community stakeholders and specific commitments</i>	Involve Entertainment area business owners to attend beat meetings concerning their establishments and work with police regarding robberies by having cameras and to report suspicious activity to the police.	Partnership with business owners to obtain access to video feeds. Work with Beat Facilitators to encourage citizens in affected areas to attend to beat meetings and work with the Community Justice Center to effectively prosecute robbery offenders.
Priority #2: Residential Burglaries		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Residents of the 19 th district.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Doors and windows smashed or pried open by the offenders and they enter the homes of the victims committing burglaries. Offenders are also pulling on doors and windows to see if they are already unlocked or open at which time they burglarized the residence.	
	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Throughout the 19 th District with higher burglary incidents located in beat 1924, 1932, 1934, and 1935	
Mitigation Missions	Mission #1	Mission #2
Description <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	Burglary team will conduct missions in the targeted areas as well as aggressive patrol of the areas during peak times of burglary patterns. Watch Personnel will be on directed Patrol as well as have beat officers familiarized with the beats they patrol.	Use social media and email blasts to share information and continued use of the SDSC/Department technology to disseminate active intelligence. Community Policing working with Beat Facilitators and Block Club Presidents in order to educate citizens of home safety by conducting Safety Seminars for homes and business as well as have literature passed out that educate on home safety.
Community Resources <i>List involved community stakeholders and specific commitments</i>	Alderman Offices can get out important information regarding burglaries in the area by email chain and post community alerts to make the community aware. Block Club Presidents and Beat Facilitators will organize their perspective beats and push for neighbor watch groups. Positive Loitering to be conducted by community groups and block clubs.	Block Club Presidents and Beat Facilitators, Selvn Neighborhood Organization and Lakeview Citizens' Council will all push their communities to "See Something, Say Something", as well as host seminars on home safety and security.
Priority #3: Narcotic Sales and Related Gang Activity		
Problem Statement	1. <i>Who is / are the victim(s) in this criminal activity?</i> Residents living in the Uptown community.	
	2. <i>Describe the methods / actions used by the offender (do not include demographic information).</i> Gang members selling narcotics by Truman College and going into the Snack For Less Store to hide out. Gang members have also been shot at by rival gang members. Offenders are selling drugs on Wilson and Broadway. Gang activity in Clarendon Park.	

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	3. <i>What is the location of this criminal activity?</i> Beats 1913, 1914	
Mitigation Missions	Mission #1	Mission #2
Description <i>Describe the missions that will address the priority/problem</i>	Collaboration between SDSC room and tact/watch/narcotic officers to target sellers in the area. Tact teams will conduct search warrants for narcotics and narcotic teams can conduct more buy/bust missions in the area. Increase in foot patrol by beat officers to proactively patrol area.	Community policing office collaborate with businesses in the Uptown community making them aware of those individuals that sell drugs and loiter and give them information on when to contact the police. Conduct outdoor roll calls and positive loitering.
Community Resources <i>List involved community stakeholders and specific commitments</i>	Faith-based institutions collaborating with block clubs and business in the affected area to conduct positive loitering as well as provide programs to youth that are at a higher risk to engage in criminal activity.	Organizations such as Centers for New Horizon, that can provide resource and job fairs to at risk individuals. One Northside Organization that does outreach to high risk youth and gang members.
